Fortunately, there was no lockdown on Monday 19th April to disrupt the 2021 Women's Inter-School Golf Challenge Cup. A perfect Autumn day saw 29 teams from member schools enjoy 18 holes of golf followed by lunch at the magnificent Commonwealth Golf Club.

Morongo has never won this event but that certainly doesn't deter us from trying! It is such a fun day and the camaraderie amongst participants continues to flourish. Each group includes one player from 4 different schools and Morongo's playing partners were from Clarendon, The Hermitage, and Firbank.

Our team included Susan Hocking, Sue Waldren, Anne Varley and Lyn Fraser with Susan winning the Nell Goff Trophy for best B grade score. Well done Susan. Clarendon were the 2021 victors with a fabulous total score of 124 points. Morongo finished 15th with 108 points. Next year I intend to invite some girls from the next generation who are showing much promise!

Roughly \$3500 was raised through entry fees and a stall. This money was donated to The McAuley Community for Women, an organisation supporting women and children who have faced family violence and homelessness.

Women's Inter-School Golf Challenge Cup

Uniting Past Female Students of Victorian Independent Schools

A BRIEF HISTORY OF THE WOMEN'S INTER-SCHOOLS GOLF CHALLENGE CUP



In 1929, a committee of twelve was formed to represent different schools to foster teamwork in Associate golf and to support a charity for women or children's charities. The schools were Clyde, Fintona, Firbank, Loreto Abbey, Melbourne C.E.G.G.S. (Merton Hall), M.L.C., Tintern, Geelong C.E.G.G.S. (The Hermitage), Ormiston, P.L.C., Ruyton and Toorak College.

A number of other schools, including Warwick were invited to participate. An annual competition was then open to associate golfers who were financial members of their Old Girls' Association of the Public and Registered Secondary Schools of Victoria.

In 2014, financial eligibility was amended and the event is now open to players who are past students of one of the member schools and hold a current GA Handicap of 35 or less.

The 1st annual inter-school golf match was held on the Cheltenham links of the Victoria Golf Club that year. Table Talk magazine donated a magnificent antique trophy, pictured. The cup of solid silver, was made in London in 1827 in the reign of George IV and was known as the Table Talk Challenge Cup.

In 1939 when Table Talk closed the Sun News-Pictorial undertook to sponsor this annual event and to provide the trophies – four silver teaspoons, one for each member of the winning team, together with a silver shield, engraved with the names of the winning team to be added to the base of the cup each year. At the general meeting in December 1940, it was agreed that play in the competition be suspended for the duration of the War.

Originally it was permitted to enter up to 14 or 15 players per school, the four best scores constituting the team. Now that there are 30 schools competing, each school enters a team of four players and the total of the stableford scores represents the school's result.

For many years the golf clubs donated their courses for the event. During the 1970's the teams started to pay a nominal fee. In the 1990's with all lady golfers being full members of their respective golf clubs and green fees becoming higher each year, the Committee are endeavouring to keep the entry fees at a reasonable level. From 1930 to 1938 the entry fee was 2/6; in 1994 it was \$25, now in 2018 the entry fee is \$105.

Each year the competition is held at a different golf club. From 1929 the day was organised by a representative and a delegate from the 12 original schools. At the Annual General Meeting in 1980 it was decided to invite a representative from each school playing to be on the Committee and for all to participate in organising the day.

The Committee now consists of 30 representatives from all the original schools (with the exception of Ormiston which is no longer functioning), together with representatives from Cato, Clarendon, Geelong Grammar, Genazzano, Ivanhoe Girl's Grammar, Kilbreda, Korowa, Lauriston, Mandeville Hall, Camberwell Girl's Grammar, **Morongo**, Presentation College Windsor, Sacre Coeur, St. Catherine's, St. Margaret's, Shelford, Strathcona, Star of the Sea and St. Leonard's College.

During the early years a different women's or children's charity benefitted from the proceeds, the donation ranging from 15 to 25 pounds. The beneficiaries included the children's sections of the Royal Victorian Institute of the Blind, the Eye and Ear Hospital, Prince Henry's Hospital, The Queen Victoria Hospital, The Royal Melbourne Hospital, The Aftercare for Paralysis Patients Hospital, The Orthopaedic section of the Children's Hospital, the Free Kindergarten Holiday Home and the Sun Toy Fund. Now our proceeds of approximately \$4,500 are donated to The Cottage by the Sea in Queenscliff. To date (2018) approximately \$64,000 has been raised in total.

The annual match has become a day which everyone looks forward to and enjoys, feeling privileged to have the opportunity to represent their old school and to compete for the much prized trophy.

Miss Kitty McEwan (Ormiston), the first honorary secretary and treasurer in our Kitty McEwan Memorial Trophy, presented to the player with the highest score in the "A" Division. Kitty held the position from 1929-1940 and again after WW2 in 1947 and 1953.

Miss Nell Goff (Warwick), held the same position for 23 years from 1954 – 1977. She is also remembered in our Nell Goff Memorial Trophy, which is presented to the player with the highest score in the "B" Division.

Early in 1995 the title of this event reverted to its original name – The Inter-School Golf Challenge Cup. The Sun was no longer interested in sponsoring either the golf or tennis inter-school annual events and so we parted amicably. Since 2007 the event has been called "The Women's Inter-School Golf Challenge Cup" due to many schools becoming co-educational.

NEWS ABOUT US

Beryl Miller Scott (Balfour) was born 17 April 1922.



She looks forward to turning 100 on Easter Sunday, 2022.

Beryl, and her older sister Daisy, went from the family farm at Willow Grove in Gippsland to board at Morongo 1934-36, where Beryl completed her Intermediate Certificate in just three years.

In 1937, the family moved into Warragul, where the girls attended Warragul High School. Beryl won a rare Senior Government Scholarship to Melbourne University, however, too young at 16, she deferred her place until 1940 and studied secretarial skills in her gap year. Daisy (dec.) commenced nursing at the Alfred Hospital.

After graduating in Arts in 1942, and completing her Graduate Diploma of Education in 1943, Beryl taught at University High School 1944-45. Upon her marriage in 1946 to Revd. Ronald Ian Scott (a Presbyterian, later Uniting Church, Minister), Beryl was forced, due to the regulations of the Education Department of the time, to resign from her work as a teacher. Beryl was very active in the work of each church, parish, and community in which her husband served, while also raising four children. As a truly skilled craftswoman, she created many wonderful articles of clothing, embroidery, and decorative crafts.

During 1952-1965, while Ron was based in Lilydale serving an extensive Yarra Valley Parish, Beryl took major initiatives with other women in raising funds locally to establish a permanent kindergarten in the town. She continued the only external studies available to a graduate married woman at that time, achieving professional qualifications as an Associate of the Library Association of Australia (ALAA). This meant that she was rarely skilled in both education and librarianship to become one of the pioneering primary school librarians in Victoria. She established the first library of its kind at the Lilydale State School No. 876 in the early 1960s.

In 1965, Beryl was delighted when Ron was called to the work of the Geelong Hospital Chaplaincy, allowing their daughter Margaret Anne to transfer to Morongo, while their youngest daughter, Virginia, attended Morongo 1968-1973. Beryl continued her work in children's literature and librarianship based at Swanston Street Primary School Geelong.

A lifelong love of reading and academic learning saw Beryl complete a Bachelor of Education at Deakin University in 1978. In later years, Beryl was active in CWA in Gippsland, and renowned for her fundraising efforts for rural nursing scholarships. In retirement, she enjoyed wide-ranging international travel, CWA membership in Ringwood, Uniting Church membership, and various U3A classes. She has enjoyed lifelong friendships, including those she made in Geelong as a young girl, and sadly misses those who are no longer around her.

Beryl maintains good health, her valued eyesight and hearing and mobility. She has always enjoyed a deep and abiding faith in the spirit. She is currently living at the aged care facility in Lilydale based in the old bush nursing hospital where her youngest daughter was born.



She continues to undertake major crochet projects, is a lively competitor in games, and looks forward to receiving a birthday letter from Her Majesty, Queen Elizabeth.

Throughout her life, Beryl has frequently spoken fondly of her attachment to Morongo and her appreciation of the happy years she enjoyed there. She is most grateful to those who have continued to circulate the newsletters telling of those who attended her beloved school.

Winter Travel Tales

Travelling in winter – in a caravan – in southern Victoria – are you mad? Well, you may think so, but that is just what we did. My husband and I wanted to visit the bushfire affected areas in Gippsland in 2020, but of course we know that Covid interrupted everyone's plans that year. So, in early May 2021, when Victoria was Covid Free, we set off in our van.

We ventured to southern Gippsland, starting in the quaint village of Loch. From there we visited French Island and learnt about the early days of Chicory farming, cattle grazing and a prison farm sited there from 1916 - 1975. We also enjoyed riding the rail trail from Anderson to Wonthaggi, with its fabulous ocean views near Kilcunda. We completed two more rail trails: Korumburra to Port Welshpool and Traralgon to Stratford.

While in the Central Gippsland area, we found amazing fungi at the Lyrebird Walk out of Mirboo North. The variety of colours, shapes and sizes were a photographer's paradise. We also witnessed an incredible wall of fog, just south of Foster, over Corner Inlet. We viewed it from the Foster North lookout.

Finding a quiet inlet at Nungurner and camping spots at Corringle Slips and the Bellbird Hotel were great little gems to add to the vacation experience. While many of you would have been dealing with power outages and downed trees, we bunkered down at Golden Beach. We had lots of rain and strong winds, but nothing like other areas of the State.

If you haven't seen the extent of and the utter devastation caused by the 2019/2020 bushfires, the eastern part of the State is well worth a visit. It is not until you actually travel through it that you realise how far the fires travelled.

But Mother Nature is truly wonderful and the vegetation is coming back, in fact some walking tracks around Womboyn (NSW) were impenetrable because the vines had taken over! We did note some positives from the bushfires though;

- The tree ferns have bounced back, they are really lush and full of colour, very vibrant amongst the blackened burnt trees.
- There were winter wild flowers in abundance.
- On a walk up both Genoa Peak and Mt Imlay, we could see further than usual because the trees were burnt.

A couple more highlights included visiting a patch of Cabbage Fan-Palm trees (left over from Gondwana land times) just north of Cape Conran National Park. Hearing and then seeing a lyrebird in the Tarra Bulga NP made our day. To consume the best fish and chips we would suggest a visit to the Port Welshpool General Store. If you enjoy fresh oysters, we recommend you ask if they have come from the Womboyn Lake. We were privileged to be given a tour there of the oyster farms and can tell you the water is pristine clean.

Our trip took us as far as Candelo, just inland from Bega. Another quaint village with lots of old buildings and friendly locals. Rising Sydney Covid numbers in July and a looming border closure forced us back home.

A reminder to those of you who may want to travel with purpose in the future, the isolated students of outback Australia would welcome you (as would their families). Look up BushED or Aussie Helpers for more information.

Frances Ormond

Ormond Road is a substantial through road in East Geelong. The Gordon Institute of Technology houses an Ormond bust. In Melbourne the statue of Francis Ormond looks across Latrobe Street.

Many of those who passed through Melbourne University may not know that Ormond College owed its existence to the generosity of the philanthropist Francis Ormond, nor those who benefited from his support in the establishment of Scotch College, Presbyterian Ladies' College plus support for the Geelong Free Library and Presbyterian Churches throughout the Western District. Then there is the Melbourne suburb and railway station which bears his name.

Who was Francis Ormond? Where did he come from and how did he accumulate his extreme wealth which enabled him to be involved in such a wide range of charitable interests?

We know that he was born near Aberdeen in 1827 and was the first born son of Captain Francis Ormond senior, a seaman who obtained his Masters Certificate at nineteen and sailed his own ship to Australia with his family in 1842. On arrival he sold his ship and initially built the Settlers Arms Inn at the crossing on the Leigh around which Shelford would develop.

When he sold the Inn, he purchased a sheep property near Skipton and began increasing his holdings in the rapidly expanding wool industry.

Young Francis supported his father so well and showed such an aptitude for the industry, that when he was nineteen, his father retired to Geelong and left the managership of the properties to young Francis.

Francis was a quick learner and through his developing knowledge and success as a stud master, he soon gained the respect of his neighboring squatters who were predominantly Scottish Presbyterians. He was soon accepted as a member of the Geelong and Western District pastoral group as his properties were producing the finest merino wool in the 1950s

His skill in breeding stock and managing stations, not only within the Western District, but also into New South Wales. Francis became a self made man who was committed to social justice.

He believed fervently in the importance of education as a force for morality and a key foundation for the advance of democracy and a tool to break down the gulf between the rich and poor. He poured his wealth into philanthropic ventures to support religious and educational institutions. Some of his other achievements included serving as the State Member for South Western Legislative Council between 1882 and 1889, his support for the Victorian Institute for the Blind and having the Ormond Masonic Lodge named in his honour.

Ormond's first wife was Anglican, he funded the final extension to St. Paul's Cathedral in Melbourne. In his will he bequeathed £5,000 each to the Melbourne, Alfred, Children's, Geelong and Ballarat Hospitals along with the Sailors' Home and the Deaf, Dumb & Blind, Geelong Orphans and Ballarat Benevolent Asylums, plus £1,000 to Geelong St George's as well as the Toorak Presbyterian Church which he assisted in founding and where he a became an Elder.

The Ormond Family occupy an impressive tomb in the East Geelong Cemetery.

If you would like to learn more about Francis Ormond, Max Griffiths book is available in local libraries and online. It is well worth the read.

Janet Boddy Senior Art Mistress (1965-1968)

Miss Janet Boddy was an innovative and passionate Art Teacher who revolutionised Morongo's Art Syllabus by introducing and encouraging the art students to many art mediums.

Before Miss Boddy, art work was usually completed on cartridge paper. Miss Boddy encouraged the design process and introduced mediums such as pottery, silk screening, oil painting, lithography, outdoor sketching, sculpture and lino cuts

Not only did Miss Boddy encourage her students to work in a variety of mediums, she took the student's learning experiences outside the school. This included visits to local and Melbourne Art Galleries and Exhibitions, viewing Art Films, outdoor sketching excursions and a creative weekend away to Airley's Inlet to paint and create sculptures. She created a sculpture and pottery making room at Morongo. Some of the resulting stone sculptures were exhibited in the courtyards of Shaw House. Other students' work was exhibited in the Geelong Gallery.

Miss Boddy was supported by a team of teachers including Miss Jan Philip (History of Art Teacher), Mrs Mair Pearcy and Miss Forster. She certainly helped create a legacy of outstanding and innovative artworks produced by senior art students.

We are saddened to hear of the following deaths;

Lyn Fraser (Crellin) 1967

We were saddened by the news that Lyn Fraser, known to many past Morongo girls as Crell, passed away unexpectedly on Friday February 4, 2022.

Born September 18, 1952, she was the third child of Brenda and Ron (dec) Crellin. She commenced her schooling at Roslyn Primary School in Belmont Geelong and came to Morongo in 1964 for her secondary schooling. She was very popular at school, was a good student and excelled in many sporting activities including tennis, netball, swimming and athletics.

Following Matric (year 12) she chose a career in nursing until she had her 4 children Sophie, Ben, Chloe and Solomon Collins. She returned to nursing in the late 90s when she completed post graduate studies in anaesthetics whilst working at the Epworth Hospital in Melbourne.

During the late 80s Lyn helped organise the Sun Tennis and Golf teams. She was instrumental in restarting annual MOCA Golf days approximately 10 years ago. The popularity of this event has grown considerably and has become a day for golf, lunch (for both golfers and non-golfers) and renewing old school friendships.

Lyn's love of life and commitment to others was evident in everything she did, netball, tennis, golf, bridge, skiing, travel, charity work, family and friendships.
